PREJUDICE & PRIDE (1965-1980)

In the 1960s and 1970s a generation of Mexican Americans, frustrated by persistent discrimination and poverty, find a new way forward, through social action and the building of a new "Chicano" identity. The movement is ignited by farm workers in the fields of California, led by César Chavez and Dolores Huerta. By the end of the 1970s, activists, teachers, and artists transform what it means to be an American. Chicano and Latino studies are incorporated into school curriculum; Latinos are included in the political process.
